ACT Government takeover of Calvary Hospital

Despite much opposition, including 32,000 signatures to a petition from the people of the Canberra-Goulburn Archdiocese, the ACT Government, on Wednesday 31 May, passed a bill to compulsorily take over Calvary Public Hospital in the ACT.

REFLECTION

"God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son."

The first human being in space, Yuri Gagarin in 1961, is supposed to have said that during his flight he looked and looked and did not see God. More recently, the James Webb Space Telescope has looked into the furthest reaches of the Universe. The distances and timescales involved are unimaginable. Our understanding of God, the creator, has to stretch to embrace them, but still we cannot see God. When young Billy was asked by his teacher what he was drawing, he answered, "God". "But nobody knows what God looks like," said the teacher. "They will when they see my drawing," Billy confidently asserted. Yet, despite the evidence of Gagarin, of the James Webb Space Telescope and of Billy, no description of God is sufficient.

Human beings have a need to explain the mysteries of life, and in every age, in every civilisation, learned and wise people have struggled to unravel these questions. Some have suggested that God is the source of life and of the whole of creation. Others deny this and say that everything stems from a coincidental coming together of prime matter which resulted in the Big Bang followed by the evolutionary process. Despite the efforts of scientists, philosophers and theologians, God is still a mystery.

Writing to the Romans, St Paul said that, although invisible, the everlasting power and deity of God are there for the mind to see in the things that God has made. We can know something about God through looking at the wonder of creation, but we still do not know God. We must wait for God to speak. This is precisely our faith, that the Lord revealed himself first to his chosen people, the people of Israel, as "a God of tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in kindness and faithfulness". Through the experience of the patriarchs, and of Moses and the prophets of the Old Testament, we come to know the God who is revealed as the Saviour of this people, called out of slavery into a new and everlasting covenant of love. Finally, the love and mercy of God are revealed in the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. When we believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the eyes of our faith are opened, and we are able to see God.

The main objection to this understanding of a God of love is the pain and suffering in this world. If God is all-powerful, if God is love, why do so many innocent people suffer, especially children? Why is there so much violence and oppression in the world? Why do rich people prosper, while those who are poor continue to lack even the basic needs?

This has been the problem taken up by many faithful people throughout the history of God's relationship with God's people. Sometimes they can take the blame on themselves, on their own infidelities. Sometimes they protest their innocence, but, in the end, the answer is to be found in the life and death of Jesus. God does not simply stand by and watch us suffering, God sends God's Son into the world so that through him the world might be saved, that those who believe might have eternal life. Jesus teaches us the way of self-sacrificing love and service of others, especially the little ones, those who are sick in body and spirit, outcasts. He does this not simply by his words, but by his actions. He is the Lamb of God who takes

away the sins of the world. It is the love of Jesus revealed in his death on the cross and resurrection from the dead that brings about the forgiveness of our sins. It is love that reconciles us with God. It is love that reconciles us with each other. It is love that enables compassion and brings peace.

Today we are invited to celebrate the Lord who has revealed himself to us as God the Father, creator and source of all life; Jesus, the eternal Son of the Father, God's Word of love made visible; and the Holy Spirit of their love, who continues to live in the hearts of all who believe. We are set free. We are reconciled. We are destined for eternal life. We live now in the communion of God, the Holy Trinity, so that in our life of love and service of others, the face of Jesus, the image of God, may always be seen in our world. That's what God is like.



The full text of the pope's prayer intention is below:

Torture. Oh my God – torture!

Torture is not past history. Unfortunately, it's part of our history today.

How is it possible that the human capacity for cruelty is so huge?

There are extremely violent forms of torture. Others are more sophisticated, such as degrading someone, dulling the senses, or mass detentions in conditions so inhumane that they take away the dignity of the person. But this is not something new. Let's think of how Jesus himself was tortured and crucified.


Let us put a stop to this horror of torture. It is essential to put the dignity of the person above all else. Otherwise, the victims are not persons, they are "things," and can be mistreated mercilessly, causing death or permanent psychological and physical harm lasting a lifetime.

Let us pray that the international community commit itself concretely to abolish torture, guaranteeing support to victims and their families.
