SOCIAL JUSTICE STATEMENT 2023-24

Listen, Learn, Love

A New Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples



Australia's Catholic bishops have called on the nation to seek "a new engagement" with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in their annual Social Justice Statement for 2023-24.

Since the 1940s, the bishops have published annual statements that urge the Catholic community to reflect and act on social, economic and ecological issues. The statements are published as a focal point for Social Justice Sunday, which is being marked on August 27 this year.

This year's statement, Listen, Learn, Love: A New Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, was launched in western Sydney on August 17 by Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv, chair of the Bishops Commission for Social Justice, Mission and Service.

"One of the objectives of this statement is that we want Catholics to understand that Catholic social teaching and Catholic social action are not simply theoretical and academic exercises," he said.

"We hear what God is saying to us about justice by being with our sisters and brothers on the peripheries of society."

REFLECTION

"You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church."

All cats are experts at meditation. No animal can meditate like a cat. Dogs don't actually bother but a cat can sit for hours in deep thought. Though we have little if any understanding of what goes on within the mind of a cat, T.S. Eliot, in his poem "The Naming of Cats", stirs the imagination with the idea that a cat in deep thought is meditating on his or her name. Not the name the cat has been given, but the name that already belongs to him or her and is known only to the cat: the cat's own "ineffable.. deep and inscrutable singular Name". If a cat's secret name is wrapped in mystery, even more enigmatic are the hidden names revealed by God in the scriptures. In Genesis, Hagar, the runaway slave girl of Abram's wife Sarai, is confronted by an angel in the wilderness and told that she will bear a son and name him Ishmael. Similarly mysterious is the foretelling of the birth of John the Baptist as recorded in Luke's Gospel when the angel Gabriel appears to Zechariah and tells him that his wife Elizabeth "is to bear a son and you must name him John." After his birth, even though by then Zechariah cannot speak, having been struck dumb for his failure to believe the angel's message, Elizabeth insists that his name will be John; and this is met with astonishment because, the gathered friends and neighbours point out, "no one in your family has that name".

Most mysterious of all and running parallel in Luke's Gospel with the foretelling of John the Baptist's birth is the account of the annunciation of the birth of Jesus. In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy the angel Gabriel appears to Mary and tells her, "you are to conceive and bear a son, and you must name him Jesus." To Mary's question of how this can happen, since she is a virgin, the angel replies, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you and the power of the Most High will cover you with its shadow."

In biblical thought a name was so much a part of a person that any change of name meant that, in a sense, the person was changed. When Abram's name was changed by God to Abraham, and Jacob's name to Israel, their relationship with God was developed to a deeper level. Today's Gospel records an unparalleled change of name. when Jesus questions his disciples, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" their answers reflect the common expectation that prophecy would be revived with the coming of the Messiah. But Jesus is seeking more than what others say about him and asks for a personal expression of faith: "But you, who do you say I am?" Simon responds on behalf of them all: Jesus is the Messiah, the Christ, "the Son of the living God." This is not an answer that he has thought of himself; he has been blessed with divine revelation. And now Jesus gives him a new name, Peter, meaning "rock", and with this new name he is changed in that his relationship with the Lord moves to a deeper level. Christ gives the assurance that his Church, built on Peter, will prevail against the powers of death; and he then gives Peter specific authority and leadership.

Speaking through the prophet Isaiah, God says, "Do not be

afraid, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by your name, your are mine." We are known to God by our name and God loves us with an everlasting love. Our baptism is celebrated in the name of the Holy Trinity and it is then that we are given our baptismal, or Christian name, becoming a "new creation". Our relationship with God is changed to a new and deeper level.

Through the gift of his new name Peter's pre-eminence among the disciples was confirmed and he was entrusted with a new mission. Still he remained subject to temptation and weakness and in this we are no different. But Peter truly loved Christ and ultimately gave his life in imitation of the good shepherd who laid down his life for his sheep. In our times of temptation and weakness may we always call upon Jesus whose name is above all other names.

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A message from the Archdiocese of Sydney

You may also want to speak to your Parish Priest who will be able to provide support and guidance. The Archdiocese has a legal obligation to report crimes to the police.

Recent Legislation affecting Parish Volunteers



Mandatory Reporting

Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998 (NSW) ('Care Act')

Mandatory reporting is the legislative requirement for those who work with children to report suspected child abuse and neglect to the Child Protection Helpline, Dept of Communities & Justice.

Amendments to the Care Act now includes the Clergy, Parish employees and volunteers that are in child-related roles.

It is mandatory to report suspicions of risk of harm in relation to children under the age of 16 years. The Care Act gives grounds for intervention to cover young people up to 18 years of age, but it is not mandatory to report suspicions of risk of harm in relation to young people aged 16 and 17 years of age.

Reportable Conduct Scheme

Children's Guardian Act 2019 (NSW) The scheme covers all workers including Clergy, Parish employees and volunteers who are required to hold a Working with Children Check.

What does it mean for You?

As a Volunteer, holding a WWCC, you are obligated to report alleged reportable conduct of other volunteers.

How to report an allegation of reportable conduct or receive assistance with a Mandatory Report?

You can report matters to the Parish Priest who will report the concern to the Safeguarding and Ministerial Integrity Office OR you can contact the Office directly on


Our response to our God given gifts
